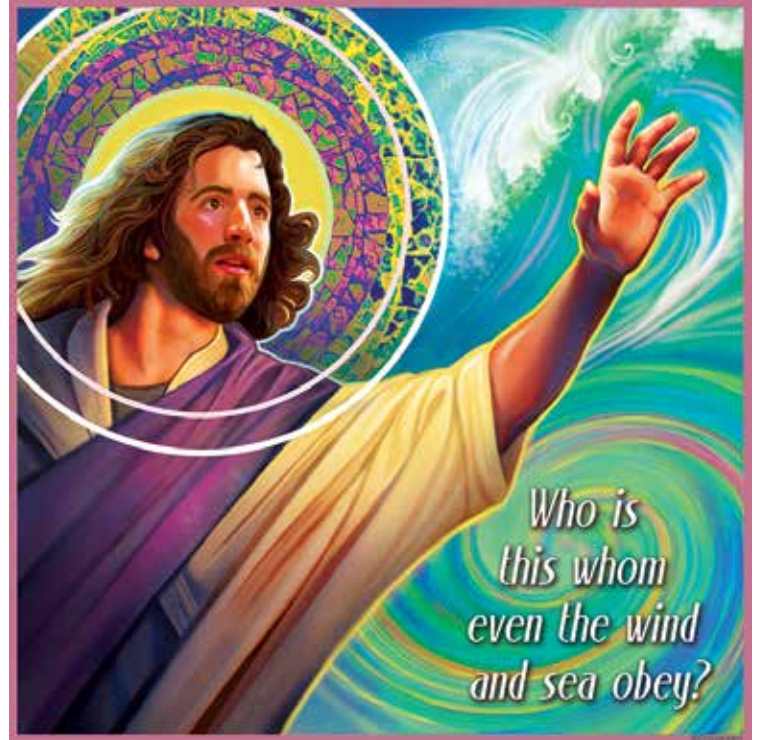

High School Tuition Discounts

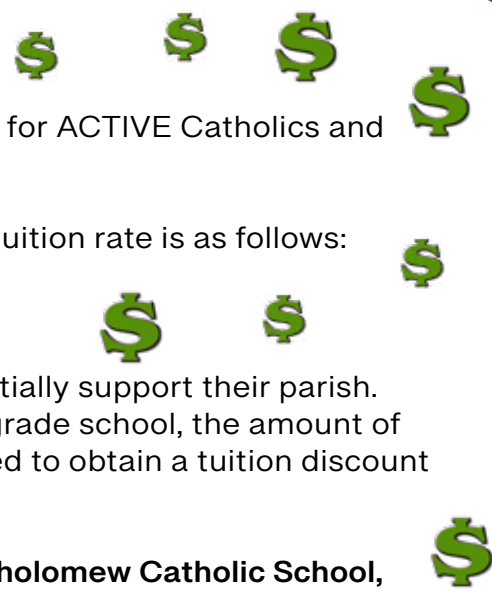
Catholic High Schools normally have two tuition rates, one for ACTIVE Catholics and another for non-Catholics or inactive Catholics.

For example, at Monsignor Edward Pace High School, the tuition rate is as follows:

Active Catholics	\$12,950
Others	\$13,950

An additional discount is available to families who substantially support their parish. The definition of substantial varies but if the parish has a grade school, the amount of the support to local parish cannot be less than that required to obtain a tuition discount at the parish grade school.

To qualify for a tuition discount (In-Parish rate) at St. Bartholomew Catholic School, a contribution to the Church of \$75 per month is required. Therefore, in order for us to sign off for you to obtain an additional discount at a Catholic High School, you must have contributed \$900 to St Bartholomew Church in the previous calendar year (2023).

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Day

Summer has arrived and with it, unfortunately, the ever-present chance of summer storms. High winds, tornadoes, thunderstorms, and flash floods make these storms frightening and dangerous. The disciples were terrified when a violent squall came up while they were sailing on the Sea of Galilee. But not Jesus. He rebuked the storm and calmed the waves. Even the forces of nature obeyed him. May we turn to the Lord during the stormy periods of our own lives. May our faith give us comfort and courage, trusting his strength and his concern for us all.

Storms dominate today’s readings, but as both the first reading and the Gospel point out, God dominates the storms. Job learns that God not only created the rain and the sea, but also set limits on them. The powerful waves are kept at bay. In the midst of a violent squall, the frightened disciples are awestruck that Jesus is able to make the strong winds and high waves obey. Let us hear how God can calm even the worst storms.

Jesus Will Calm Your Inner Storm

Today, in the Gospel of Mark, we read that Jesus calmed the storm when He and the apostles were out at sea. We all know this story. Jesus had fallen asleep when a storm began to brew. The apostles, fearing they would capsize and drown, became terrified. So they woke up Jesus and said to Him, “Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?” Jesus then calmed the storm and asked them, “Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?”

Jesus didn’t ask “Do you not have faith?” He asked, “Do you not *yet* have faith?” The word *yet* is an integral part of that question. We could ask the same question to ourselves when we encounter difficulties in life or when we feel sad and alone. These are the times when we may feel like we are perishing. And sometimes we may even feel like God doesn’t care.

How many times, out of despair, have we asked Him, “Jesus, where are you?” We allow fear to take over. We allow the outside world to convince us that God doesn’t care, that we are not lovable, and that we are all alone. But we are never alone. No matter what we go through in life, Christ is there for us. Christ is there *with* us. In those times, He could ask us the same question, “Do you not yet have faith?”

So how do we build that trust we should all have in God? We get to know Him. We read stories in the Bible or other religious books. We talk to Him in prayer. We count our blessings. We think about the love we have for our children or the love our parents have for us, and we multiply that love by a thousand. Our Heavenly Father loves us more than we can even begin to imagine. And that love should calm our inner storm. That love should keep us from giving in to sadness, anxiety, and fear.

Yes, we may still feel these emotions, as they are a normal part of being human. But the difference between having faith and not having faith is the ability to acknowledge those feelings, lay them at the foot of the cross, and simply say, “Jesus, I trust you to calm this storm.” And then believe that He will.

God himself teaches us with this passage just how much he dislikes complaining. Our Psalm proclaims: “Give thanks to the Lord, his love is everlasting.” And that sums it up right there. Period. We have the love of God, what more do we need? Thanks be to God!

Our second reading only confirms this thought. “The love of Christ impels us...whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come.” Everything on this earth will pass away. Yet we should not fear, because we are a new creation in Christ and his love impels us forward.

In today’s Gospel, the disciples fell into fear, and Jesus reminded them of his great power and love by calming the storm with just three words: “Quiet! Be Still!” When we call on him in faith, he can calm our storms as well. No matter how strong the winds or how tall the waves, Jesus can help us.

So whenever life’s many trials and tribulations get you down, remember that complaining won’t get you anywhere. Instead, lift your heart and mind to our all-powerful God and give thanks to him, whose love is everlasting.

MOTHER OF PERPETUAL HELP

This image of Mary seems to tell a story: Jesus has run (see that one of his sandals is dangling from his foot) to Mary for protection from the vision of the angels holding symbols of his passion. As Mary comforted him then, so she looks out to us now to help us in our times of need.



Saint John the Baptist's Story

Jesus called John the greatest of all those who had preceded him: "I tell you, among those born of women, no one is greater than John..." But John would have agreed completely with what Jesus added: "[Y]et the least in the kingdom of God is greater than he" (Luke 7:28).

John spent his time in the desert, an ascetic. He began to announce the coming of the Kingdom, and to call everyone to a fundamental reformation of life. His purpose was to prepare the way for Jesus. His baptism, he said, was for repentance. But one would come who would baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire. John was not worthy even to untie his sandals. His attitude toward Jesus was: "He must increase; I must decrease" (John 3:30).

John was humbled to find among the crowd of sinners who came to be baptized the one whom he already knew to be the Messiah. "I need to be baptized by you" (Matthew 3:14b). But Jesus insisted, "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15b). Jesus, true and humble human as well as eternal God, was eager to do what was required of any good Jew. Jesus thus publicly entered the community of those awaiting the Messiah. But making himself part of that community, he made it truly messianic.

The greatness of John, his pivotal place in the history of salvation, is seen in the great emphasis Luke gives to the announcement of his birth and the event itself—both made prominently parallel to the same occurrences in the life of Jesus. John attracted countless people to the banks of the Jordan, and it occurred to some people that he might be the Messiah. But he constantly deferred to Jesus, even to sending away some of his followers to become the first disciples of Jesus.

Perhaps John's idea of the coming of the Kingdom of God was not being perfectly fulfilled in the public ministry of Jesus. For whatever reason, when he was in prison he sent his disciples to ask Jesus if he was the Messiah. Jesus' answer showed that the Messiah was to be a figure like that of the Suffering Servant in Isaiah. John himself would share in the pattern of messianic suffering, losing his life to the revenge of Herodias.

Reflection

John challenges us Christians to the fundamental attitude of Christianity—total dependence on the Father, in Christ. Except for the Mother of God, no one had a higher function in the unfolding of salvation. Yet the least in the kingdom, Jesus said, is greater than he, for the pure gift that the Father gives. The attractiveness as well as the austerity of John, his fierce courage in denouncing evil—all stem from his fundamental and total placing of his life within the will of God.
