



Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time Use It or Lose It

When I hear the Gospel reading for this Sunday, I wonder what that third servant was doing all that time, after he buried the talent he was given. Probably nothing. What strikes me is that the word for money in this reading is "talent," which in our language is an ability or skill. So maybe this parable can remind us to use our abilities and not let them go to waste. It is sad to see someone who is not very good at his job just because he never developed his inborn talents. But if you know what gifts or abilities God gave you,



you can develop them to be much more than you expected. A person might be strong and fast, but if she exercises and practices, she could be a great athlete. The same with a spiritual gift. Just having one doesn't make you a saint. So how do you know what gifts you have? First, ask God in your prayers to show you what gifts you have been given. Find a spiritual director, or even your parish priest, and talk about your life, your strengths and weaknesses. Read about saints and how they used their gifts to serve the Lord. Read the scriptures, especially the Acts of the Apostles or the Letters of Paul (e.g., 1 Corinthians 12:1–11). Listen humbly to friends or loved ones who can tell you what strengths they see in you. Second, look for ways to use your gifts. Check the parish bulletin or website or your diocesan newspaper for activities and organizations that you could take part in. Hospitals, schools, shelters, and nursing homes frequently offer opportunities for volunteers. If one kind of service seems attractive to you, that could be God's way of telling you to try it. On the other hand, a job that seems very challenging could be what you need to stretch your spiritual muscles. Or you may see a need for some service that you can get started in the parish or community.

Just remember that you are called to service by your baptism and confirmation. Don't bury that calling by procrastinating or being afraid to try. Remember the "useless servant" with the one talent who was fearful and lazy (Matthew 25:25–26). At least he can remind us to use it or lose it.

Cive Shanks on Thanksgiving day

In today's Gospel, Luke recounts the story of the healing of the lepers. At the time of Christ, lepers were one of the most marginalized and isolated groups. In order to avoid spreading leprosy, which is highly contagious, they were not even allowed to live with their families. Those who had leprosy were without hope because their ailment could not be cured. Lepers were considered unclean and, therefore, sought purity. When they encounter Christ, they recognize Him as someone who can heal them and grant them purity. When Christ heals the ten lepers, He then tells them to show themselves to the priests so that they may be welcomed back into the community. However, only one of the ten comes back to offer praise and thanksgiving to Christ. And Christ's response is, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

How often do we ask something of God in prayer and receive it but then forget to give thanks? How often do we forget to give thanks for our everyday blessings be it our jobs, families, food on our tables, roofs over our heads, etc.? The Gospel acclamation today is "In all circumstances, give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Jesus Christ." That seems difficult, right? What if our circumstances are less than ideal? What if we have a lot on our plates or are going through a tough time? It seems impossible to give thanks when those are the circumstances, but we ought to look at those circumstances as an opportunity to unite our suffering to that of Christ on the Cross and give thanks for his Passion and Resurrection.

We can continuously offer thanksgiving to God by staying close to His sacraments, especially the Eucharist. Eucharist means thanksgiving and, by taking part in this Sacrament, we are taking part in the suffering, death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. We are recognizing that he laid down his life for us in order that we may be saved. He became man so he could say to each one of us, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

On this Thanksgiving day, may we not take for granted all our blessings. May we praise God for all His works and remember that our faith will save us.

Earnest and Energetic Effort

When I look at today's reading, I think of the word "diligence." Diligence is defined as a "steady, earnest, and energetic effort." I don't know about you, but when it comes to effort, I am more of a sprinter than a long-distance runner. I would rather put in a lot of effort for a short period of time, then, satisfied with my frantic activity, sit down and drink a Gatorade under a shady tree and take a nap.

As we read Scripture, there is no doubt that the Christian life is a race of perseverance and diligence (see Heb 12:1). In the Gospel today, Jesus tells the parable about a master giving his servants money "each according to his ability." The master expects a return on his investment. His two faithful servants do not attempt to get rich quickly, rather they engage in legitimate business and produce results. When the master returns "after a long time," he praises them. They had no need to be afraid or ashamed.


Hopefully, as Catholics, our aim is to do the will of the Father and make the most of the gifts and the grace God has given us. When we are young, we might be tempted to think, "I'll start using my time, my gifts, my resources to bless others and to grow in my relationship with Christ tomorrow. I am too busy with my own stuff right now." Those who think this way may be developing lazy, self-centered habits that will be hard to break when "tomorrow" comes.

Or if we are older Catholic faithful, we might be tempted to say, "I have made so many sacrifices to get where I am. It's time for me to enjoy life." There is nothing wrong with enjoying the fruits of our labor, but our lives aren't spent serving others so that we can reach a certain point and then start serving only ourselves.

No matter where we are in life, when our focus becomes ourselves, we lose. Through passive and negligent Christianity, we weaken ourselves to the point where we could even lose our souls. This is no light matter. God is merciful, but we must not forget that we will have to give an account for the graces He has poured out on us. "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much" (Lk 12:48). On the day of judgment, hopefully we will not be like the third servant who makes poor excuses for his weak and fruitless Christianity.

Imagine instead hearing our Father say, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Since you were faithful in small matters, I will give you great responsibilities. Come, share your master's joy." May we learn how to diligently cooperate with the grace of God so that we can please our loving Father, growing in intimacy with Christ and minister to others through our "steady, earnest, and energetic efforts."
